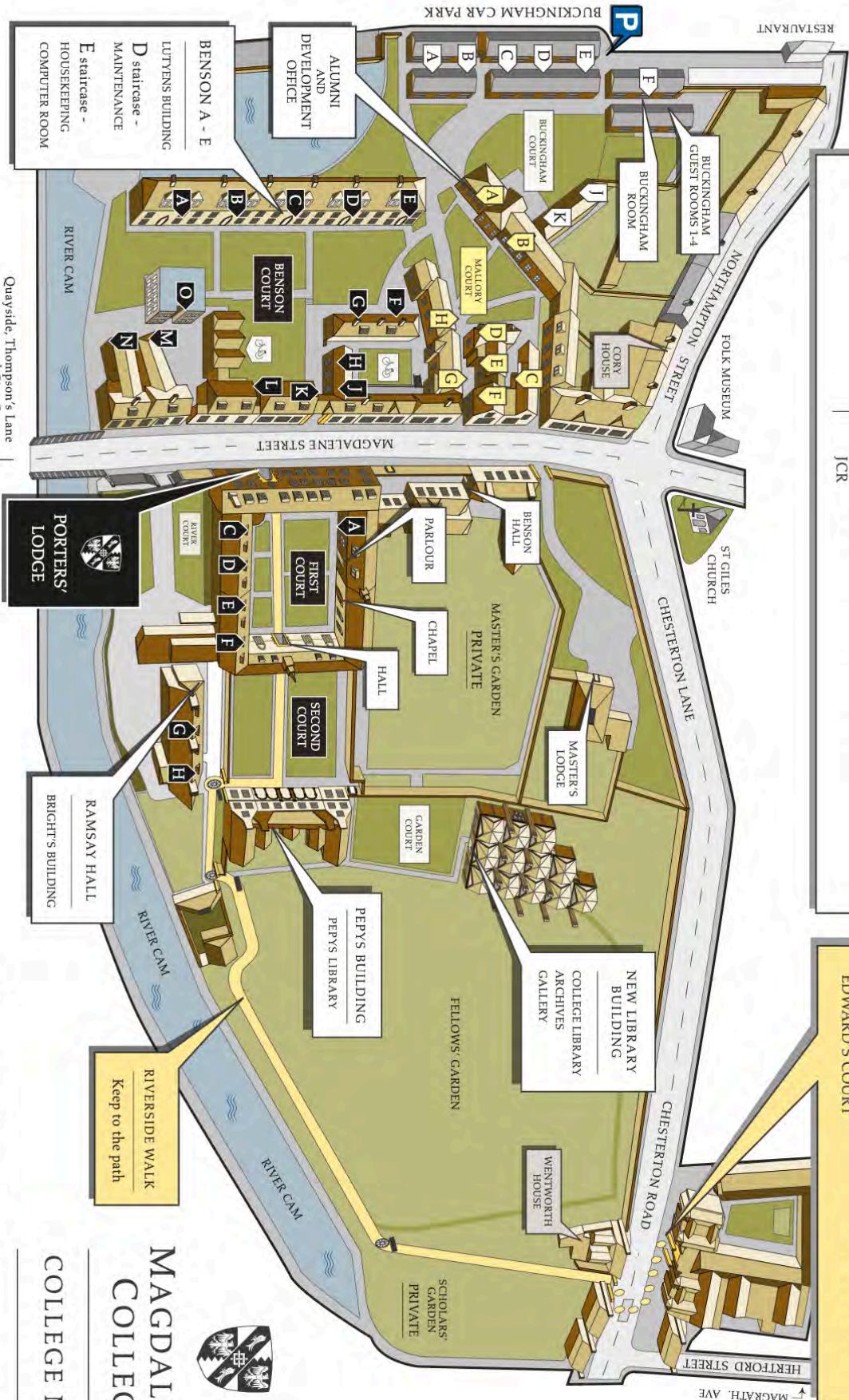

WHY MAGDALENE?

Magdalene is one of the oldest and smallest colleges. We have around 350 undergraduate students, equating to about 105 students in a year.

We are a welcoming and friendly community.

The College currently offers all undergraduate subjects taught by the University, so you will get to meet a variety of people. In recent years, there has been a roughly equal split between arts/humanities and science students.

The College is located in central Cambridge so many of the things you need are a close walk away. Some examples include:

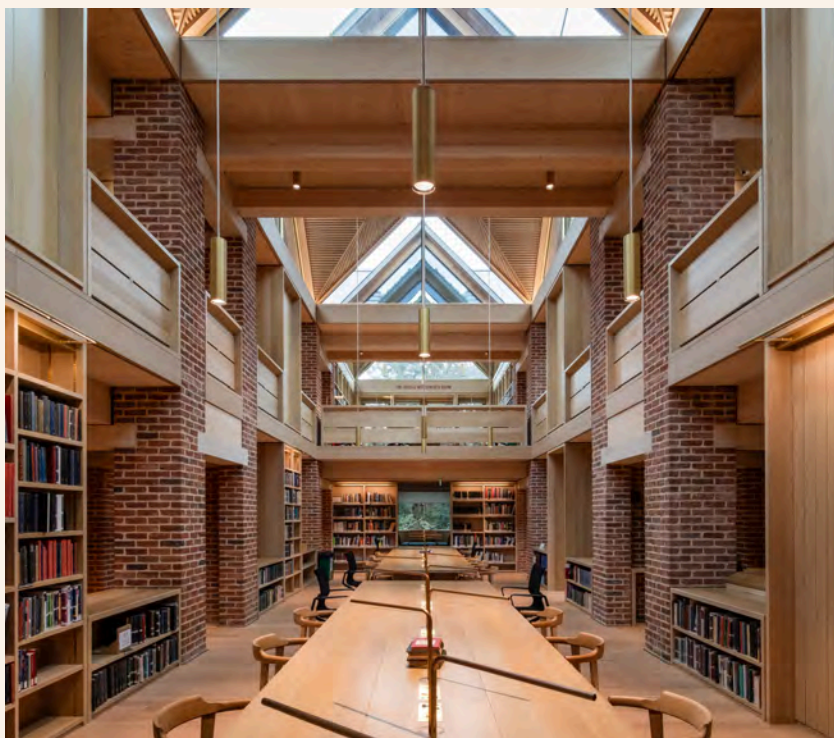

NEW LIBRARY

The New Library, opened in 2021, is a lovely, bright study space with plenty of room to accommodate students.

A 17th-century alumnus of Magdalene, Samuel Pepys, is best known for his diaries documenting the Restoration, Great Plague and Great Fire of London. He donated his original diaries to this College.

The collection is held in the Pepys Library, located in Second Court. Special tours for students are sometimes organised by the librarians.

WHAT DO THESE CAMBRIDGE TERMS MEAN?

Director of Studies - a member of academic staff (often a Doctor or Professor in your subject) who looks after your academic experience at Cambridge. They oversee your supervisors and meet with you to discuss your progress.

Fellow - an academic associated with a college.

Formal - an optional three course dinner served to you whilst you catch up with friends in Hall. Magdalene is one of the only colleges with a formal hall that is purely candlelit.

Gown - a long black robe worn to formal, Matriculation and Chapel services. Each college's gown is of a particular design and colour.

Gyp - a kitchen within your accommodation.

JCR - Junior Combination Room. This is a social space for undergraduates to convene and watch TV or play video games. The JCR is a student committee who represent our undergraduates' views and advocate for students during meetings with College staff.

Matriculation - the day you are officially enrolled in our College! The day begins with a year group photo, usually in front of the Pepys Library, and ends with a formal dinner in our candlelit hall.

Pidge - your pigeon hole, found in the Porters' Lodge. This is where your post is left.

Plodge - our Porters' Lodge is situated in First Court. Our friendly Porters are available 24/7 and can help with anything, from needing a plaster to having locked yourself out of your room.

Ramsay - our canteen. Students can eat here seven days a week, with a special brunch being offered on the weekends!

Supervisions - time with doctoral students, lecturers, Professors or other experts where you can discuss your work and be given support.

ACCOMMODATION

Magdalene seeks to provide accommodation for all years of an undergraduate course. Much of Magdalene's accommodation is on site, with the remaining housing no more than five minutes from College. We have a range of rooms, some with en-suite, some with river views and some with 'sets' - meaning you can have a separate bedroom and study room. Accommodation blocks commonly have kitchens with hobs, a kettle, toaster, sink and cupboards for storage. A few houses have ovens, but this is infrequent at Magdalene and most other colleges.

The rooms are each allocated a rent band which designates a price to the room, depending on its size and features. In the 2025-26 academic year we have rent bands A-K ranging between £243.74 and £143.92 a week respectively. Students pay for 10 weeks of accommodation for each of the three terms. You are made aware of the rent band when choosing a room, helping students to choose a room which fits their budget.

FOOD

FORMALS

Formals are optional three course meals in the formal dining hall, pictured below. We are one of the few colleges that have a completely candlelit hall which adds to the special atmosphere. It costs £11.65 (2024/25) for the evening. You can invite guests from other colleges or any friends and family from home, up to a set number and for an additional cost. The dress code is smart; as a College member you wear your gown on top, which you will purchase when you join the College.

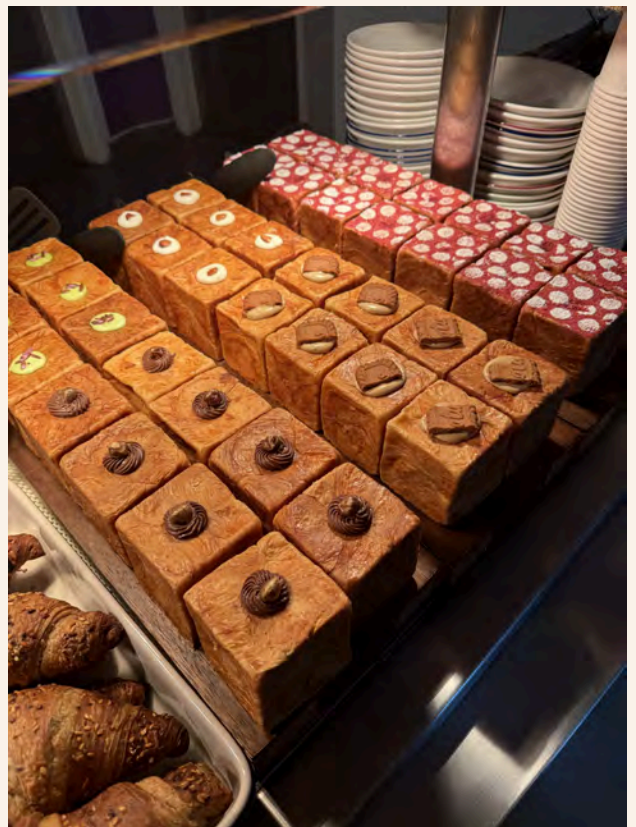
RAMSAY

As well as cooking for yourself, you can visit Ramsay, our general cafeteria, which is open 7 days a week. Lunch and dinner are served during the week and brunch and dinner is offered on weekends. Food is provided at a subsidised rate, with a meal costing between £3 and £6 in 2024-25. A cheaper option is also often available. Brunch is often cheaper and there are meal deals available during the week. The kitchen team cater for all dietary requirements, including vegetarian and vegan options which are available every day.

WELFARE

The Health and Wellbeing Service is dedicated to supporting the wellbeing of students. They currently provide a comprehensive wellbeing programme.

Students can come to the service with any issue, whether it is mental health, physical health, disability related or anything else.

They currently offer freshers' appointments which are brief check-ins used to understand individual needs, discuss mental health and counselling options and agree a plan moving forward. Wellbeing appointments are available for mental health advice, support or just a listening ear for all manner of emotional, personal or mental health concerns. They also currently provide physical health appointments for assessment and support for minor injuries and illnesses.

'We have a range of fun and relaxing free weekly events such as yoga and felting workshops. We have had visits from owls and dogs during our Tea at 3 events. This is where you can gorge on chocolate fudge cake, sip on fancy green tea, pet the College dog and remark, as always, how adorable she is.'

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Academic support comes in the form of a Director of Studies (DoS) who is an integral part of your academic journey. Your DoS is there to help with any queries you have during your time as a student. You are able to get in touch with them at any point. You can also contact your Faculty if you need further support. In addition to your DoS, we have a Royal Literary Fund Fellow who is available to help you develop your writing skills.

PASTORAL SUPPORT

Tutors are here for your pastoral care. They are an academic who is not affiliated with your subject. You are welcome to get in touch with them if you need support during the term. You meet with them at the end of every term to tell them about how things are going. Every Tutor will have office hours each week which you can attend.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Cambridge Bursary: In 2024-25, the Cambridge Bursary provided free financial support of up to £3,500 a year for certain full-time undergraduate students paying Home fees, to help with Cambridge fees or living costs. UK students with a household income under £62,215 per year may currently be eligible for some support.

Magdalene Bursary: If you are entitled to the full Cambridge Bursary, Magdalene will add a further College Bursary, currently on a sliding scale of up to £2,000 per year. As it is a bursary, it is also non-repayable.

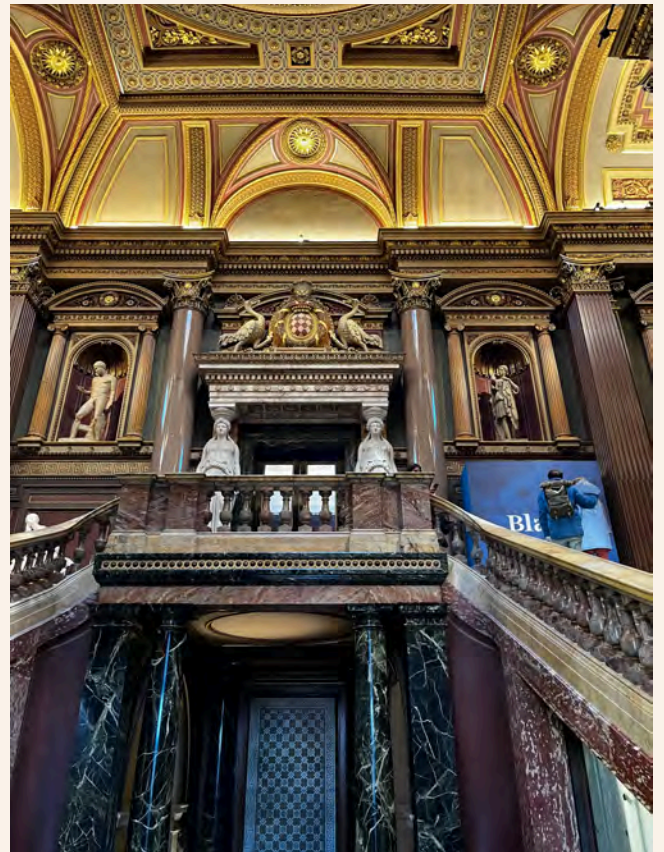
